January 2009 Meeting

Members began the New Year with two great presentations about advanced cleaning technologies. Chris Deets, marketing director of Activeion, flew in from Minnesota to discuss what they call a "cleaning revolution."

Activeion, a hand-held cleaning device, utilizes ionized water to safely and effectively clean surfaces. Studies have shown that it can replace up to 47 different household cleaners.

Hi MQ,

A system I developed is TECS, The Efficiency Cleaning System. A team approach is today's and
